

- E ALL Allen, Debbie. [Dancing in the Wings](#). 2000.
Sassy tries out for a dance festival despite the other girls' taunts that she is much too tall.
- E BUC Buckley, Helen Elizabeth. [Grandfather and I](#). 1994.
A young boy relishes the time that he and his grandfather share exploring the world around them while others hurry to their appointed tasks.
- R COS Cosby, Bill. [Hooray for the Dandelion Warriors!](#). 1999.
Little Bill and his teammates are excited to begin baseball practice, but they cannot agree on the team name. (Part of the Little Bill Series)
- J CURTIS Curtis, Christopher Paul. [Bud, Not Buddy](#). 1999.
Ten-year-old Bud, a motherless boy living in Flint, Michigan, during the Great Depression, escapes a bad foster home and sets out in search of the man he believes to be his father– the renowned bandleader, H.E. Calloway of Grand Rapids.
- J FENNER Fenner, Carol. [Yolonda's Genius](#). 1995.
Yolonda is bigger, stronger and smarter than anyone else in the 5th grade. After her family moves from Chicago to Michigan, she is determined to prove her brother is not a slow learner but a true musical genius.
- E HOW Howard, Elizabeth Fitzgerald. [Virgie Goes to School With Us Boys](#). 2000.
In the post-Civil War South, a young African American girl is determined to prove that she can go to school just like her older brothers.
- E MCK McKissack, Pat. [Goin' Someplace Special](#). 2001.
In segregated 1950s Nashville, a young African American girl, braves a series of indignities and obstacles to get to one of the few integrated places in town: the public library.
- J MEA Mead, Alice. [Junebug](#). 1995.
Ten-year-old Reeve McClain, Jr. – Junebug – shuns the gangs and drug dealers who inhabit the projects where he lives, and dreams instead of being a ship's captain and sailing away. Then Junebug's mother gets a job offer that would mean a move, but the decision is not as easy as it seems.
- J MYERS Myers, Walter Dean. [Patrol: An American Soldier in Vietnam](#). 2001.
In a gripping and powerful story-poem, the author takes readers into the heart and mind of a young soldier, in an alien land, who comes face-to-face with the enemy.
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When his mother gives him a garden plot for his tenth birthday, Jackson Jones hopes to earn enough money to buy a basketball, but all he seems to get is a big mess of trouble and weeds.
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During the Alabama bus boycott, six months after Rosa Parks made her famous bus protest, Alfa Merryfield and his family struggle to pay the rent. But someone keeps stealing their rent money – and now someone is accusing them of stealing!
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Noted poet Ntozake Shange recalls her childhood home and the famous men who gathered there such as Paul Robeson and Duke Ellington.
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A boy dreams of flying an airplane, even though the men who run the airport refuse to let African-Americans fly.

A collection of speeches and writings by African Americans, with commentary about the time period in which each person lived, information about the speaker/writer, and public response to the words.
- J 323.1 MCW McWhorter, Diane. [A Dream of Freedom: The Civil Rights Movement from 1954 to 1968](#). 2004.
A chronicle of the turbulent years of the civil rights movement from *Brown v Board of Education* to the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King. The volume includes many photographs.
- J 398.2 LES Lester, Julius. [Tales of Uncle Remus: The Adventures of Brer Rabbit](#). 1987.
A retelling of the Afro-American tales about the adventures and misadventures of Brer Rabbit and his friends and enemies.

- J 811.54 WOO Woodson, Jacqueline. [Locomotion](#). 2003.
In a series of poems, eleven-year-old Lonnie writes about his life after the death of his parents, the separation from his younger sister, what it is like to live in foster care, and with the help of his teacher he discovers his poetic voice.
- J 921 JOH Green, Michelle Y. [A Strong Right Arm: The Story of Mamie "Peanut" Johnson](#). 2002.
This is the story of Mamie "Peanut" Johnson, a woman who had to overcome the obstacles of gender and race to pursue her dream of playing baseball, and became one of only three women (so far) to play professional baseball.
- J 921 KIN Farris, Christine King. [My Brother Martin: A Sister Remembers Growing Up With the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.](#) 2003.
The author describes growing up with her younger brother, ML, who before he became world famous was a little boy who played jokes, practiced the piano and made friends with children of all races.
- J 921 ROB Robinson, Sharon. [Promises to Keep: How Jackie Robinson Changed America](#). 2004.
Sharon Robinson shares memories of her famous father in this warm loving biography of the man who broke the color barrier in baseball. Jackie Robinson was an outstanding athlete, a devoted family man and a dedicated civil rights activist.

Drawing on first-person accounts by leaders and ordinary people in song, poetry, memoirs, letters, and court testimony, this history brings alive the experiences of black Americans in the U.S. from the time of emancipation to the *Brown v Board of Education* in 1954.

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
